Masters Swimmer Sylvia Eisele

It is with much sadness that I inform you of <u>Sylvia Eisele</u>'s passing on October 12, 2022 at the age of 93. According to online sources, she was born in Vienna, Austria on September 28, 1929. She later became a swim champion of the Austrian National Team competing during the 2nd World War. She moved to Canada in 1954 and started swimming and competing there. Canadian Masters Swimming started in Canada in 1971 after Hud Stewart and Al Waites came back from competing at the 2nd annual AAU Masters Short Course Yards (SCY) National Championships in Amarillo, TX. Stewart formed the University of Toronto Swim Club, the first official Canadian Masters team.

The Masters Swimming Ontario archives shows Sylvia swimming at the first Masters meet in Canada on April 15, 1973, hosted by the Etobicoke Olympium Masters Aquatic Club (EOMAC). In 1976 she was on the Canadian Masters Swimming Steering Committee. At the age of 47 she attended the 1977 SCY AAU National Championships in Fort Lauderdale, FL May 13-15 representing Ontario Masters (OM) as a member of EOMAC. She finished first in both the 100 and 200 breaststroke in the 45-49 age group.

In 1978, Canada held the first Senior Age Division International Aquatic Long Course Meters (LCM) Masters competition with ten countries competing, including the United States, at the Etobicoke Olympium in Ontario. Swimming in the 45-49 age division, Eisele finished 1st in the 50 breaststroke, 2nd in the 100 breaststroke, 3rd in the 200 IM, and 4th in the 100 butterfly.

In 2006 at the FINA World Championships in Stanford, CA she competed with The Ontario Masters Swimmers (TOMS) Canadian team, swimming the breaststroke in the Women's 280-319, 200 Meter Medley with Michele Oliver, Judie Oliver and Doris McEwan. They broke the World Record time of 3:09.63 that was set by Arizona in 2005 with a time 3:02.07. At that meet, in the 75-79 age group, she placed first in the 50 Breast and 2nd in the 100 and 200 Breast. She was inducted into the Mississauga Sports Hall of Fame on June 1, 2006.

Sylvia also swam and competed as a member of United States Masters Swimming (USMS), starting around 1991. She joined Holmes Lumber Jax (HLJ), 1991-1993; Swim Florida Masters (SWIM) 1993-2004; Florida Aquatic Combined Team (FACT) 2004-2009; SWIM - 2010; and FACT - 2011 - 2015. During that time Eisele garnered 274 Top 10 individual swims and 20 Top 10 relays. She achieved All American status ten years for individual and three years for relays.

Eisele held 13 lifetime individual USMS records from 2000 - 2014 and two currently held lifetime relay records, both accomplished in 2009. The first, swimming the breaststroke in the Women's 75+ 200 SCY Medley with FACT teammates <u>Betty S Lorenzi</u>, <u>Nancy N Durstein</u>, and <u>Mary C Tusa</u> in a time of 3:15.12 at St Pete Masters 39th Annual SCY Championships on March 27-29. And the second, swimming breaststroke again in the Women's 320-359 200 LCM Medley with FACT teammates Betty Lorenzi, <u>Nancy Durstein</u>, and <u>Joan K Campbell</u> in a time of 3:47.69, breaking the 1998 record of 4:19.11 set by Walnut Creek Masters. She currently holds the record for the 50 Short Course Meter breaststroke in the 85-89 age group which she set in 2014 with a time of 1:00.96. At the age of 85 she contributed to a 1st place USMS Top 10 finish in the 85+ 200 SCY Mixed Freestyle Relay with FACT teammates Betty Lorenzi, <u>Milan Kutanovski</u> and <u>John Cornell</u> in a time of 3:24.43 at the Florida International Senior Games & State Championships, December 13-14, 2014.

Joan Campbell recollects about Sylvia and her husband Nick, "<u>Dick Brewer</u> was an ANGEL!! He was the savior of all their belongings when the roof blew off their condo during a hurricane. She was so appreciative of all he did for them. Her poor health over the years was uncomfortable to live with: heart problems and falls. She had Nick and his great sense of humor."

We will all miss Sylvia Eisele.

Following through with the 4th National competition of the year, Martha Henderson and I competed in the Long Course Summer Nationals in Richmond, VA. Both of us improved times and my competition, if any, didn't show up so six gold medals helped our Regional Club score – We came in 6th!! Martha, of course added four gold and two silver medals.

On the way home or at the meet I managed to catch COVID – very mild case but it set back the training schedule. I recovered in time to swim the Dog Days LCM at the Long Center. This meet is becoming quite popular as the last chance to catch a time during the LCM season, which ends September 30.

Martha was a victim of COVID as the Rowdy Gaines SCM came into view, but she also got a mild case and recovered to get a great high point 85-89 performance – She swam the 800 and 400 IM the same day. I'm tired thinking of it. My 9 events over the three days earned me the 90-94 high point and with the help of Michael Garcia from our FACT group we managed the 2nd Place Regional Team trophy. Pat Tullman anticipated a holiday family visit in Rhode Island – her daughter Deb came down with COVID and she got to relax for the weekend!

Our FACT Regional team is registered for the 2023 season. Encourage some of the many small teams to form a workout group or join us. It's a great opportunity to make up some good relays instead of attending meets by yourself. Also, join during November-or December and save on your registration fee – the fee is going up to \$70 in January 2023!!

We had some sad news this week. Sylvia Eisele, our elite swimmer from Toronto area during the early 2000's, passed away. She is still listed with records in the backstroke and breaststroke and with some relay National records for our FACT team. She and her husband Nick were popular members when she participated. Unfortunately she was a victim of dementia in the past 6 years. She was 92. Her husband Nick, 95, is still around but in poor health.

How to Become an Official

Why should you become an Official? Because we need you!

Officials are essential to USMS and FL LMSC. We cannot run USMS sanctioned or recognized meets without them. We currently have a great team of Officials but the team needs to be larger. When you go to a swim meet, it may seem there are plenty of Officials. We need to train and certify more Officials to make sure that continues.

Why attend an Officials clinic?

Because it is great fun and you get to meet new friends!

Our LMSC Officials' clinic covers:

- How to Become an Official
- Instruction and discussion of each stroke's rules
- Instruction and discussion of how to be a good Starter
- DQ slips
- Stroke rules for physically handicapped swimmers
- Starting for hearing impaired
- On pool deck demo of good, bad, and ugly strokes
- Chance to practice Starts using Colorado equipment
- Copy of the USMS rule book
- Refreshment of lunch and snacks
- Chance to meet friends and network with other volunteers and Officials

You do not need to take the test to start shadowing and apprenticing as an Official.

- 1. Look at the <u>Southeast Zone</u> web site for upcoming meets near you. Contact the meet referee or meet director and introduce yourself as a volunteer who is interested in being an Official.
- 2. Go to the link <u>How to Become a USMS Official</u>. Watch the online videos, take the open book test, and send the results to the Officials email, <u>officialscertification@usmastersswimming.org</u>.

I am devoting much more time to Masters swimming and feel it has helped me tremendously. This article was published with me as "Athlete of the Week". Rachel Chambers

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Rachel Chambers is a 50-year-old Sarasota triathlete and was the first female finisher and 12th overall (1:01:56) out of 226 participants at the 2022 Top Gun Triathlon held Aug. 6 in St. Petersburg.

When did you start competing in triathlon?

You know, I just turned 50 and I ran my first triathlon 25 years ago, so I have been doing it for half my life now. I started as a runner in junior high and high school in Noblesville, Indiana. Then I attended Indiana University in Bloomington and would bike around campus there. Then I moved here and met my husband (Tom Chambers) 26 years ago. He was a triathlete, so I went to one of his races and loved the energy of it. It was so positive. I wanted to compete in it myself so I worked on my swimming. The first triathlon I ever ran was the Clermont sprint triathlon a year later.

What is the appeal to you?

The positive energy is a big part of it, but I also love the variety of training

you get. Not every day is the same. You're moving between the pool and the track and your bike. I like to train consistently and train hard and if I was a single-sport athlete, I wouldn't be able to do that. You get overuse injuries because you are using the same motions and muscles every day. So I'm adaptable. I like switching it up.

What is your favorite leg of the triathlon?

I don't know if I have one anymore. In the beginning, I couldn't wait to run. Then it was the bike. Now I love the swim just as much. And you know, a triathlon is more than just running, biking and swimming. There's the transitions, too, and that's where I really shine. You have to move fast. Some people sit around on buckets and take their time putting on their socks. Not me.

What makes for a good transition?

Rehearsing is important. My husband is an amazing supporter and he will help me research the course and find out where we swim in and out, bike in and out, etc. Knowing your spots is important. Also, at the Fort De Soto race (Top Gun Triathlon), there were so many bikes. I wanted a way to see where my bike was, but if you put something on the back of your bike to mark it, the officials will take it away. So I put some baby powder on the concrete next to my bike. Some of the other people there said, 'Oh, that's a good idea!'
